FPCNE MEMBER CELEBRATES UNIQUE MILESTONE



Lifelong member Bert Page became a centenarian on October 6, 2017. He was born at home on October 6, 1917, to Jessie and Robert Page. His younger sister is Betty Page.

Bert has been a member of this congregation since March 24, 1929, on which date he was also baptized. He was ordained as an Elder in

January 1948 and served six years on Session. He served two more back-to-back terms on Session from 1992-1997.

Bert attended McCord School from First through Eighth grade. He is a NEHS graduate, Class of 1936. Bert has been a North East resident his entire life.

After high school, Bert attended Erie Business School. When his Dad passed away, Bert was compelled to take over the operation of the fruit farm on Brickyard Road. Originally, Page Fruit Farm was owned by Robert and his brother John Page. Upon Robert's death, Jessie inherited Robert's share and eventually gave it to Bert. Over time, Bert owned the entire farm.

The Page farm produced grapes, damson plums and prunes. During his adolescence, Bert, with the help of Betty, picked these crops after school. Their summer days were spent picking sweet and sour cherries. Bert and Betty were paid a bit more because their baskets didn't contain leaves or twigs.

On October 23, 1945, Bert married Frances Grabowski. They were married 63 years until Frances died on July 3, 2009. When Frances was the youth group leader, Bert was by her side assisting. He even went on retreats out of his devotion to the Lord, Frances, and the youth. Also memorable, was their annual "Fish Fry" Bert and Frances hosted at their house for those who attended the Greenfield Sunday school class.

At one point, Bert joined the Shriners. His Dad wanted to join too, but could not afford it. Nevertheless, his Dad supported and encouraged his son's participation.

Bert's favorite pastime used to be going to deer hunting camp (now it might be keeping current by reading the newspaper). He loved going to the camp, not to hunt, but to fraternize with "the fellas". Even so, he opted to bring along his gun in case he got lost in the woods. (Bert doesn't have it in him to shoot any sweet creature!)

Remarkably, Bert has never had the need for eyeglasses. He said they would just get in the way if he ever did need them. He doesn't consider himself much of a reader (except for newspapers), however, in the past several years, he has discovered the enjoyment of reading books.

Bert has many hours logged as a volunteer at the North East Railroad Museum and (again) enjoyed fraternizing with the guys there on Saturdays. He and his buddies gathered by the newspaper recycling shack, in all kinds of weather, to help people haul in their stacks of newspaper donations.

Today, Bert resides down the road at Brevillier Village in Ball Pavilion. He loves sitting in the hallway looking out the big glass windows. Betty also lives at Brevillier, in Barnabas Court South. On nice days, Betty takes him for walks outside to admire the manicured grounds and pristine lakeside views.

To celebrate Bert's 100th birthday, our congregation participated in a card shower, and many congregants made personal visits.

MISSION COMMITTEE NEWS

It's almost bell ringing season for The Salvation Army. What is The Salvation Army, and for what are the "red kettle" donations used?

For starters, The Salvation Army was established in 1865 as an evangelical part of the universal Christian church. Each year, almost 30 million Americans receive assistance from The Salvation Army. Assistance might be in the form of food for the hungry, relief for disaster victims, practical help for the disabled, outreach to the elderly and ill, clothing and shelter to the homeless, and opportunities for underprivileged children.



The Salvation Army's ministry is motivated by the love of God and its message is based on the Bible. Its mission is to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ and to meet human needs in His name without discrimination.

According to their website, "The motivation of The Salvation Army is love of God and a practical concern for the needs of humanity. This is expressed by a spiritual ministry, the purposes of which are to preach the Gospel, disseminate Christian truths, supply basic human necessities, provide personal counseling and undertake the spiritual and moral regeneration and physical rehabilitation of all persons in need who come within its sphere of influence regardless of race, color, creed, sex or age."

It is important to know that whenever someone donates money into one of those highly recognizable red kettles, those funds support local services. The Salvation Army does not engage in national fundraising. Money collected in each community is dedicated to best serve the people in that community who are struggling with all kinds of personal disasters.

Here in our community, the North East Council of Churches has partnered with The Salvation Army to help it raise funds. Volunteers will be ringing the bell at Sander's Market during November and December.

Your mission committee is asking for your help in this effort. Our congregation's designated day to ring the bell is Friday, December 1, 2017 from 10:00 A.M. to 6: 00 P.M. This day has been broken into one (1) hour blocks, so we are asking for you to give up one hour of your day to ring the bell. Also, we will be inside the lobby not outside. Eighty-seven percent (87%) of the money collected from this location will stay in North East to help those in need.

Do you have a heart to help others? This is a great use of one hour of your time! There is a signup sheet in the Assembly room on the bell cabinet waiting for you to "Ring the Bell!"
